

Route

SEATTLE: Bremerton ferries leave Colman Dock on Sunday mornings, June 5 and June 12, at 8:10, 9:00, 10:00, 10:40 and 11:30. Buses will meet all these ferries and carry passengers direct to The Mountaineers' property. Returning, buses will get passengers to Bremerton in time to catch the 4:55 or 5:55 p. m. ferries. For those in no special hurry to get home, we suggest the use of the 6:55 p. m. ferry.

It is also possible to take the Vashon-Harper ferry, leaving Fauntleroy in West Seattle, but no special rates or schedules are available for those choosing this route.

BREMERTON: The seven-mile drive on the well-paved Bremerton-Seabeck highway will be clearly marked.

EVERETT: The Seattle route is recommended as the most satisfactory. However, an alternate route by way of the Edmonds-Kingston ferry is available. Ferries leave Edmonds for Kingston at 9:30 and 11:45 a. m. and returning, leave Kingston at 4:30 and 6:30 p. m. The time of crossing is about 30 minutes and driving time from Kingston to Kitsap Cabin is 45 minutes.

TACOMA: For those driving, take the Gig Harbor ferry. The route to Bremerton from Gig Harbor via Port Orchard is recommended.

From the versatile pen of Samuel Clemens comes a romantic story of the great riches and pathetic poverty which divided England at the end of the reign of Henry VIII.

When two youths, one the Prince of Wales and the other a beggar of Pudding Lane, playfully decide to trade places, there ensues a dramatic sequence of events. The two boys, each dressed in the other's clothing, look so much alike that they deceive the royal courtiers and lowly ruffians alike.

Meanwhile, Tom Canty, the beggar turned prince, is bewildered by the strange life at court. Unable to convince the royal attendants of his true identity, Tom tries valiantly to assume regal mien. His troubles as Prince of Wales mount when the King dies, and Tom is prepared to be crowned as the new King!

How the true prince outwits his lusty companions and makes his way back to court in time for his own coronation is a dramatic climax to this famous story.

The Forest Theatre

THE CENTRAL ATTRACTION of the 125-acre rhododendron and virgin timber preserve belonging to The Mountaineers is this natural amphitheatre rich in rustic charm and wooded beauty, a Northwest adaptation of the traditional Greek theatre. From the Kitsap Cabin picnic area the trail winds down a rhododendron-banked hillside to where the audience views the play from the slopes above the stage. Beds of ferns are the footlight and sunlight twinkling on the not-too-distant stream gives the effect of spotlights; Nature's own screening of trees and fresh green foliage provides the backdrops. Bark-covered wings, silvered with age, serve as entrances and exits for the stage where the land of make-believe becomes a reality in the Forest Theatre.

TRANSPORTATION TICKETS: A special COMBINATION BOAT AND BUS TICKET has been secured through the Puget Sound Navigation Company. The special rate provides ferry transportation between Seattle and Bremerton, and bus transportation between Bremerton and The Mountaineers' property. There is also a special round-trip ferry ticket for those going in private cars. Regular round-trip fare applies for car and driver. Children's tickets are approximately one-half the adult price.
