#### LEGEND OF A FOREST THEATER

They say it all started in 1918 with a mock christening of Patience Paschall's cow over at Hidden Ranch. Such great talent emerged (from everyone but the cow) that skits became a regular feature of Kitsap Cabin events, and by 1923, on a Sunday in June, the first full-length play, "Robin of Sherwood," enthralled a group of 100 Mountaineers.

Crowds increased rapidly, and a hardy group calling themselves the Mountaineers Players started hacking out a new theater to the designs of Bill Darling. It was to be a unique "Forest Theatre"—a glen in a deep wood where the natural beauty of wild rhododendrons, dogwoods, ferns and towering firs would blend with comedy and drama to give outdoor theater goers an unusual experience.

Professor Edmond Meany, President of The Mountaineers, dedicated this beautiful theater on June 6, 1926, and 500 Mountaineers who had come by boat from Seattle and hiked two miles up from Chico then saw "Reinald and the Red Wolf."

It wasn't long before the secret was out, and requests from friends and the public brought an expanded theater where all could be welcomed.

Thousands of Players have trod the bark "stage" behind our fern "foot-lights," many finding mates among their fellow Thespians. Yes, Androcles really did marry the Lion (1954)!

And in true "the show must go on" tradition, you won't find a performance cancelled because of the weather. That's because you, our faithful audience, always come—so we can perform (even if we have turned blue!).

So now, 60 years later, Forest Theatre is a legend. And we wish to thank you for your support and encouragement over the years, in attending our efforts. If you have ever taken part in our show productions in any way—acting, props, scenery, costumes, publicity, ushering, parking—all the scores of tasks that make it all possible, we especially want to thank you for helping to keep this Legend alive!
